

It has been a long time since I wrote an article but last year was a busy year that ended with me finally marrying, on New Years Eve, the man that God intended for me to be with.








We will be voting in our New Royalty for 2014 before our February 1st playday. We have five girls running this year. They have been practicing for the competition.


